SPIRITUALITY OUTREACH STEWARDSHIP

Calvin

We have completed the Year of Paul to observe his 2000th birthday. Since Calvin was born 500 years ago, he does not get a year. But in the spirit of Christian unity we should look back and learn a bit. We learn that the pendulum swings in terms of liturgy and theology. So, the Eucharist as sacrifice is stressed at times and then Eucharist as meal. Frequent reception of Holy Communion has been encouraged and also discouraged. Calvin and Luther saw that the Catholic pendulum swung too far and was suggesting that Catholics were encouraged to manipulate God, the most gracious One. But this bulletin article does not want to over simplify the issues or long theological discussions that are part of history. So a bit about Calvin.

Born in France on July 10, 1509. Calvin was a brilliant young man who intended to be a Catholic priest but entered law instead. After encountering the writings of Protestant Reformers such as Martin Luther, Calvin had a conversion experience. "God subdued and brought my heart to docility," he said. Breaking away from Catholicism, he left France and settled in Switzerland as

an exile. In 1536, Calvin published one of the greatest theological works ever written, The Institutes of the Christian Religion. This major systematic theology, which begins with God the Creator and ends with reflections on civil government, stands as one of the most important expressions of Reformation thought. Not bad work for a 27-year-old.

Calvin's workload in Geneva was staggering: He pastored a church and preached daily in it, wrote commentaries on almost every book in the Bible, authored dozens of Christian pamphlets, trained and sent out missionaries, and influenced the schools and the civil government. No wonder Calvin suffered from chronic migraine headaches! The city of Geneva became a magnet for Protestant exiles from all over Europe. So what made Calvin and Geneva so magnetic? When discussing Calvin's theological themes, remember that your pastoral purpose is not to offer a history lesson but to provide comfort and teaching for the soul. Therefore, you speak of theological themes so you can offer them as encouragement in real time, right now

In the gospel we hear that the blood of Jesus is the sign of a new covenant. By our drinking of the blood of Jesus and our eating of his body, we accept this new covenant of divine self-gift and personal presence. Even more, we are that presence for the world, called to the same self-giving. Truly the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ. Just as truly do we who consume this Bread and Wine become more perfectly the Body of Christ.
